The Need:

Improved FCAT Scores

At the end of this month, the Martin County School District will begin administering the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Tests, or the FCATs, which are used to determine a student's comprehension of the state's new Next Generation Sunshine State Standards. Our county's students far exceeded state score averages last year—and it's no




accident. School readiness preparation begins when children enter child care as toddlers and continues beyond the regular school day with after-school programs that provide tutoring and preparation classes. FCAT scores do more than ensure students are performing at grade level. Research shows that children who are not reading on grade level in the 3rd grade are less likely to graduate from high school—and in turn more likely to be making significantly less money while working in the local economy. Strong FCAT scores are good for students AND our community.

The Children's Services Council of Martin County is an independent district, approved by voters by referendum in 1988, to enhance the lives of the children of Martin County and to enable them to attain their full potential by supporting 34 impactful programs for youth in our community. Early Learning Coalition:

Studies show that academic struggles early in school can be a reason to drop out—so it's a priority to start teaching children early so they never feel behind. Thanks to the Early Learning Coalition, which contracts with 21 Subsidized Child Care School Readiness Child Care facilities in Martin County, even children of families who could not afford child care

will be able to have the same foundation as those in families who can. For families whose total income is 150% below the federal poverty level, the Council helps to fund child care for children ages birth to 5, ensuring they are ready for school and ready to learn.

With the Big Brothers Big Sisters mentoring program, 50% of children matched with mentors for one year show an increase in their reading and/ or math FCAT scores. This is impressive because many of these "Littles" would otherwise be struggling not only academically but also with other difficult life decisions, like avoiding alcohol use or negative peer situations. Spending quality time with "Bigs" lets children know there's an adult mentor who cares and is rooting for their success everyday.

The YReads program is geared toward students in grades kindergarden to third who are struggling academically but whose parents would not be able to afford after-school care or intensive tutoring. During the after-school hours, students receive individualized help (with a 2:1 ratio) from tutors offering intensive reading and vocabulary sessions twice a week for 45 minutes. But it's not all work—there's fun, too! Participating students also enjoy arts and recreational activities, as well as daily homework help with the goal of improving their FCAT scores.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Martin County: High-Yield Learning


The very first thing that members do when they come from school to their Club is homework. With a program called "Power Hour," children learn to prioritize their school work and receive individualized tutoring when needed. This—along with offering enriching programs and adult mentors—keeps kids focused on performing well in school and looking toward a future of success.




This collaboration keeps students performing at grade level in a variety of ways. First, Tykes & Teens' Alternative to Out-Of-School Suspension (ALTOSS) program prevents troubled kids from falling further behind in school when they're being punished. Second, after-school programs run by the city and the Boys & Girls Clubs include tutoring and homework help every day. In fact, certified teachers volunteer from nearby J.D. Parker Elementary to provide extra help to those students who need it the most. Finally, supportive adult role models and positive activities encourage kids to stay on the right path and do well in school.

The Impact: Great FCAT Scores

8th Grade FCAT Scores in Martin County have steadily increased from 1997 to 2009:




8th Grade FCAT Reading Scores (500 Point Scale)

Success: **Academic Success**

When Brianna* was in third grade at Port Salerno Elementary, she was really When Brianna* was in third grade at Port Salerno Elementary, she was really struggling with her classwork and the FCATs—especially in reading. She was having trouble with her social skills and self-confidence, too. Since she lives with her

grandparents and brother, Brianna's teacher recommended that she receive a match through Big Brothers Big Sisters of Palm Beach and Martin Counties. In 2009, she was matched with her "Big Sister," Jane*.

Jane began mentoring Brianna weekly at her school. Each week, they worked on reading, homework and the Character Counts pillars. Their friendship grew and both wanted to continue seeing each other over the summer. They were both accepted into Big Brothers Big Sisters' Community-Based Mentoring Program, which then allowed them to attend community outings as well.

Today, Brianna has gone from a shy, quiet young girl who was receiving a D in reading to a girl who is now achieving mostly A's and B's. She has also gained confidence, knowing that she has a special friend to rely on. Her Big Sister Jane talks to Brianna about believing one day she will be able to go to college. The two love the outdoors, enjoy cooking and baking, making crafts and exploring our local museums.

Brianna has a special place in Jane's heart. She instills the concept that Brianna can be anything she wants to be and encourages her to always strive to do her best—on the FCATs and beyond.
