# The Need: Immunization

Immunizations have protected millions of children and adults from potentially deadly diseases and helped to dramatically change the horizon of health in America. That's why health officials in Martin County continue to track and support efforts to keep our children free of polio, Hepatitis B, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria and other potentially devastating diseases.

Although proof of a list vaccines is required for entering kingergarten and seventh grade, many parents worry about what some believe are links to such disorders as autism. However, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that such concern originated with a specific preservative, which was removed from all vaccines except for one type of influenza vaccine in 2001. Thus, officials contend that immunizations are a smart, safe and important responsibility for all parents.

The Children's Services Council supports and encourages immunization. The Martin County Health Department provides required immunizations for eligible children from birth to 18 at no charge. Is your child up to date?





# What's required?


Public/Non-Public Schools, Kindergarten through 12th Grade:

- Four or five doses of diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTaP) vaccine
- Two or three doses of hepatitis B (Hep B) vaccine
- Three, four, or five doses of polio vaccine
- Two doses of measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine
- Two doses of varicella vaccine for kindergarten and grades one through four
- One dose of varicella vaccine for grades five through 11

In addition to kindergarten through 12th grade requirements, students must have the following vaccinations:

• One dose of tetanus-diphtheria-pertussis (Tdap) vaccine in grades seven through 10

August is a busy time for Martin County Health Department School Health nurses and staff as they gear up for the start of the new school year.

Helping Families Stay Healthy

Throughout the academic year, School Health nurses work in the schools to provide health screenings, trainings and education for students and school staff. The nurses are dedicated to keeping students healthy, so they can live up to their learning potential.

Success:

Part of keeping children healthy includes making sure that kids get recommended and required vaccinations. Vaccines help prevent serious viruses including chicken pox and pertussis, also known as whooping cough.

Assuring that children receive the required vaccinations for school entry requires a collaborative effort by the Health Department, School District and community partners.

Education and promotion about required immunizations for the upcoming school year begins in April and continues throughout the summer. The Health Department offers appointments and hosts immunization clinics to answer questions and assist parents in achieving vaccination requirements.

Immunizations are free for children and adolescents 18 years old and younger through the Vaccines for Children program. Immunization records are logged into Florida Shots, the state data bank. Collecting, coordinating and entering this data is a huge task when you realize that more than 2,000 students are expected to begin kindergarten and 7th grade in Martin County public schools this year.
